



Lisburn

The Biennale launches on 28 July with the joint opening of two exhibitions in Lisburn:

Common Threads a group exhibition at the Island Arts Centre, and Connected Emotions, a solo exhibition by Jill Phillips at R-Space Gallery.

Lisburn sits at the heart of the historic Ulster Linen Triangle.

Today, it is the home of **The Irish Linen Centre and Lisburn Museum**. At its heart is the **Lagan Valley Island**, location of the Island Arts Centre, which was built on the site of the Island Mill Spinning Company. And of course R-Space Gallery at the Linen Rooms, headquarters of the Linen Biennale.

The founders of the Biennale believe that linen and flax should be central in the cultural regeneration of Lisburn. It is an authentic story with many facets, awaiting interpretation in new and innovative ways. Other cities who have embraced their own industrial and material heritage as cultural assets, have seen a growth in tourism, an increase in civic pride, and an impact on economic growth.



Flax for Paper

Artist **Regine Neumann** is visiting from Canada over July and August. She will be building networks for her *FlaxPaperLab* project which aims to develop new strategies for working with flax pulp and integrate collaboration into papermaking.



New Commissions

A number of significant Northern Irish artists are also being supported to produce new work in response to the themes underpinning this year's Biennale.

This work will be presented towards its close in October in another evocative venue, soon to be announced.

Linen Alive NI

We want to celebrate Northern Ireland's linen story, connecting various pockets of specialist knowledge that remain with us, and build partnerships to safeguard the skills and experience in danger of being lost for good.

We are gathering resources and contacts for artisanal knowledge, archives and collections, alongside sites of particular significance for the linen industry. These will remain accessible on our website after the public programming is finished. Existing key resources include:

NI Screen's Digital Film Archive

A special online collection of footage showcasing the linen industry in its prime. The collection gives a glimpse into the changing fate of the local linen industry, from the fields full of flax just a few decades ago, to the abandoned mills found in so many of our towns, cities and surrounding countryside.

Public Records Office Northern Ireland (PRONI)

Holds archives and business records of the linen industry that made Northern Ireland a world-renowned exporter, synonymous with quality. PRONN is accessible to the public by appointment and is the main venue for researching family and local history, and for discovering the economic, social and political history of Northern Ireland.

National Museums NI

National Museums will bring a tangible presence to Banana Block in East Belfast through a plywood facsimile of the Dressmaker's House in Cluan Place. The new exhibit which is scheduled to launch in August will explore the Dressmaker's story, the linen history of the mill and the effect of industry on how communities lived.

Ulster Folk Museum

The **Ulster Folk Museum** puts the past in dialogue with the present in order to inspire and shape the future. It holds the *Living Linen Archive* (accessible by appointment), plus a collection of over 300 oral interviews with people who worked in the linen industry in the last century.
